Looking Back - 5 years ago

Having just returned from the 30th IAJGS International Conference on Jewish genealogy in Los Angeles, I am reminded that it was only five years ago that we the Jewish Genealogy Society of Southern Nevada undertook a similar task. With a small group of our members, plus wonderful volunteers from across the country, we first met in 2003, to see if we could do it.

The conference brought together 650 genealogists from around the world - to study, network and yes, even do some research. The only sour note for the week was that the weather wanted to show off to our visitors, and the heat topped 110 during the entire week! Attendees said it was hot, but it wasn't until *four* days after the conference ended that we broke a record for the highest temperature ever in Las Vegas - **117° F** (47° C) on July 19, 2005!

Why bring this up now? While in Los Angeles, with seven other JGSSN members, you realize what a rich environment these and similar conferences are. The inevitable question arises, why after attending about 25 conferences in the last 30 years, why still keep going? The simple answer is to see all the people you know in the genealogy world. The real answer is 'to be reminded of all the research tools you know how to use, but somehow forget to use everyday'.

This same philosophy holds true for our monthly meetings. If you haven't been with us lately or have never been to our meetings, then come join us as we recall all the methods we used to use, and learn about new methods and databases that come public, almost daily.

Part 1 : Locating Lost Classmates

Pursuing genealogy includes searching for living relatives as well as deceased ancestors. Recently, in preparation for a high school reunion, Hal used the techniques honed in finding missing relatives to find eleven of twelve high school classmates who had gone missing over the years. This talk will describe the techniques used to successfully find these "lost" classmates who had scattered across the country, changed names and had no contact with other classmates for years, or even for decades

Part 2: Why Did Our Ancestors Leave a Nice Place Like the Pale?

In 1880 fully 80 percent of our ancestors lived in Poland and Pale of Jewish Settlement in western Russia. We all know of the pogroms (organized violence) and mass exodus of our ancestors to points west over the next generation. This talk will provide background on the 120 years of the Pale from its formation at the turn of the 19th century to its dissolution during the First World War. It will provide some context to our ancestors' lives in the Pale, and of course, their decision to leave everything they had known to make new lives in the West.

Hal has been researching eight lines for over 27 years, identifying 4,000 relatives and tracing two of these lines into the mid 1700s. A former president of JGSLA and IAJGS, he created and continues to edit the annual Jewish Genealogical Yearbook. Hal has spoken at numerous conferences, synagogues and society meetings on topics from computing to geography to brick walls.

LOOK OUT FOR THE MACHINE

When I was young, I used to have to visit my grandmother Raizel Kline TARGOWNIK most every week. She lived in a tenement on the lower east side of New York, on the corner of Rivington and Sheriff Streets. The building was about 100 years old at the time and I hated it and the neighborhood. To this boy from the Bronx it was filthy and smelled bad.



Before we went to my grandmother's fourth floor apartment, we usually stopped at my aunt Bertha RUTCOFSKY (my father's sister) and her husband Phillip's apartment on the second floor. They had eight children and lived in a three room apartment. Like most people in the neighborhood, they appeared very poor.

The RUTCOFSKY's first child, Pearl, was killed by a truck when she was about six years old. I had heard about this at a fairly young age, Whenever I visited, my aunt would be found sitting at the window overlooking the street where Pearl died. She would constantly yell at her youngest child "Shimmy, look out for the machine (car)." To be honest, I always thought there was something wrong with her.

A few years ago, while talking to a cousin, I found out the whole story. Pearl was decapitated in the accident and Bertha, sitting at the window, saw it all. That finally made me understand why she acted the way she did.

Recently, I discovered that in 1935 there was a settlement of \$3,500 from the US Trucking Company. I figured that equates to about \$100,000 today. Thinking about this, I couldn't understand why they continue to live in such poverty. Because of this question, I asked one of her surviving children about the money. He told me his parents didn't accept it as they considered it "blood money". I can't help but think how much better off they and their children would have been with the money. And I can't help but think that the family would have paid anything to have Pearl back with them.
